To help us, we educate our pupils to utilise the BE SMART rules when accessing the online world, which incorporate the 4 C's of online safety (Content, Conduct, Commerce, Contact):

BE SMART				
5	SAFE	Keep safe by being careful not to give out personal information, such as your full name, email address, phone number, home address, photos or school name- to people you are chatting with online.		
Μ	MEETING	Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission and even then only when they can be present.		
A	ACCEPTING	Accepting emails, messages, or opening files, pictures or texts from people you don't know or trust can lead to problems- they may contain viruses or nasty messages.		
R	RELIABLE	Information you find on the Internet may not be true, or someone online may be lying about whom they really are.
